From Faxnet to ScrapTheftAlert.com

Honest scrap recyclers in general and ISRI members especially, have been proactive in the fight against metals theft. Metals theft is certainly not a new issue and neither are the cooperative efforts of ISRI members to work with law enforcement and community leaders. Well before copper prices spiked to more than \$4/lb. in 2010-11 and copper theft became big news, ISRI members initiated a program which would eventually evolve into the current ScrapTheftAlert.com (STA) system.

In 1993, when prices hovered near the \$1/lb. mark, recyclers recognized the need to establish expedient communication with law enforcement in order to identify stolen materials. Nondescript stolen metals are difficult to identify, especially when a recycler is unaware of recent thefts. Recyclers realized direct and speedy theft notifications could help cut down on the problem. Using the best technology at the time, recyclers hit on the idea of regional fax networks; later to become known as Faxnet. With Faxnet, police notified area recyclers of scrap thefts and provided descriptions of the stolen material. Police were able to scan documents and transmit information to a list of stored fax numbers. In some cases, ISRI members even purchased fax machines for local police departments in order to further the acceptance of the program.

As technology advanced, so too did the industry's alert system. Today, STA is accessible by anyone with access to the Internet, is free and easy to use, and covers the entire United States and Canada. For more information view the [STA brochure](#) online.

Cell Tower Batteries

As reported in the April BOLO News, theft of cell tower back-up batteries continues to be a problem. These batteries can cost as much as \$500 each to replace. Nearly one-third of all STA alerts broadcast in May were for cell tower batteries. Law enforcement is reminded that thieves not only target electrical substations and cell tower sites for copper cable, but also for batteries.
