

State Reopening Requirements

States are moving from essential vs non-essential closures to health and safety requirements for all businesses maintaining or reopening in-person operations.

- 22 States + D.C. have active Stay-at-Home Orders with closures of non-essential.
 - Some states are allowing extremely limited reopenings of specified industries while maintaining a general closure requirement.
- 21 States are in the reopening phase.
 - AL, AK, AZ, CO, FL, GA, ID, IN, KS, ME, MN, MS, MO, MT, NH, OH, OK, SC, TN, TX, VT
 - Most are removing distinctions between essential and non-essential.
 - All have included health and safety requirements for operating businesses.
 - Patchwork of restrictions and closures by city or county remains.
- 7 States only issued targeted closures of entertainment / close contact services.

H&S requirements include face coverings, social distancing, cleaning, screening, etc.



Samples of Various State Rules

Colorado: Limited reopening, extensive H&S requirements for critical businesses

- Includes face covering and glove requirements, mandatory daily screening, and extensive social distancing, hygiene, and cleaning requirements and guidance.
- Additional requirements for retail and businesses with 50+ employees.

Idaho: Phase 1 reopening; almost all businesses allowed to operate


- All businesses must adhere to social distancing and sanitation requirements
- Guidance on face coverings, PPE, screening, and vulnerable individuals.

Maryland: Closure order in effect; retail requirements & essential business guidance

Local health officials authorized to close any facilities they judge unsafe.

New Jersey: Non-essential retail closures; requirements for all open businesses

 Includes special requirements for manufacturers and retailers on cleaning, screening, distancing, signage, and face coverings.

Appendix A: Social Distancing Protocol

Many local jurisdictions mandate very specific rules - could be different than state law

A.	SIGNAGE						
	Signage at each public entrance of the facility to inform all employees and customers that they should: avoid entering the facility if they have a cough or fever; maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another.						
	Signage posting a copy of the Social Distancing Protocol at each public entrance to the facility.						
B.	MEASURES TO PROTECT EMPLOYEE HEALTH (CHECK ALL THAT APPLY TO THEFACILITY)						
	Everyone who can carry out their work duties from home has been directed to do so.						
	All employees have been told not to come to work if sick.						
	Symptom checks are being conducted before employees may enter the workspace.						
	All employees that have contact during their shift(s) with the public or other employees are offered, at no-cost, a cloth face covering to be used at work when interacting with them.						
	All desks or individual workstations are separated by at least six feet.						
	Break rooms, restrooms, and other common areas are being disinfected frequently, on the following schedule: □ Break rooms:

	Disinfectant and related supplies are available to all employees at the following location(s):

What's Open and Closed: Information on phased re-opening of Washington's economy.

- Essential Businesses: Up to date guidance on classification as an essential business.
- WA Proclamation 20-25.3: Safe Start Phase 1: extends Proclamation 20-25 (Stay Home) and related proclamations through May 31 except for specific activities. Establishes <u>Safe Start Washington</u> phased reopening plan and allows counties to request exemptions from specific aspects. Listed business activities to reopen by May 15 with industry-specific requirements (to be issued) includes retail (curbside pickup orders only).
- WA Proclamation 20-25: Stay Home, Stay Healthy: Non-essential business closures effective March 25. Prohibits leaving place of residence except for essential activities or employment in
